Course Overview:	The Doctor of Educational Psychology course trains students in professional areas of the discipline of educational psychology. The program has three broad emphases: training, through classroom teaching, in the theoretical, conceptual and empirical knowledge relevant to the practice of educational psychology and in the skills relevant to various areas of professional practice; supervised practical experience in the application of knowledge and skills; and research training, including the conduct of a thesis. A major objective of the course is to train educational psychologists to have a strong academic and research orientation in their professional activities.			
Objectives:	 Students who have completed the Doctor of Educational Psychology should be able to: # demonstrate a strong grounding in the theoretical and empirical basis of educational psychology; # demonstrate highly developed skills in professional practice; # participate at a high level in the systematic analysis of practical problems in educational psychology; # undertake a substantial piece of original research in educational psychology that is informed by knowledge of educational psychology practice and by a high level of professional skill in educational psychology. 			
Course Structure & Available Subjects:	Students are required to complete a total of 300 points, comprising ten compulsory subjects (totalling 112.5 points) together with five field practica (totalling 87.5 points) and a research thesis of 45,000 words (100 points).
