Subject Overview:	This subject introduces graphic skills appropriate to design and building. Tutorials are held in the studio and outdoors and are developed concurrently with the graphic skills required in Construction Technology 1A and Architectural Design 1A. Emphasis is given to development of orthographic and perspective drawing, delineation and representation of form and volume. In addition, content includes two modules: digital skills and life drawing. On completion of the subject students should be able to:
