<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject develops an appreciation of the role of language in Aboriginal Australia, traditionally and today. On completion of the subject, students should have a general knowledge of the linguistic features which characterise Australian Aboriginal languages, including characteristics of grammar and pronunciation, and understand the ways in which social factors affect language structure and use in Aboriginal Australia.
<b>Objectives:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># have developed an appreciation of the role of language in Aboriginal Australia, traditionally and today;</li> <li># have a general knowledge of the linguistic features which characterise Australian languages, including phonological and grammatical characteristics;</li> <li># understand the ways in which social factors affect language structure and use in Aboriginal Australia;</li> <li># be able to crack the code of unfamiliar languages and cultures;</li> <li># appreciate the complexities of Australian indigenous cultures, as they surface in their languages.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	Problem-solving assignments totalling 2000 words 50% (due throughout the semester) and an essay of 2000 words 50% (end of semester).
