Subject Overview:	In this subject students will study key aspects of Italian culture, through the analysis of literary texts and other materials. Students will also have the opportunity to study the development of Italian society. By the end of the subject, students will have been introduced to a number of themes and texts in order to gain some understanding of the process of cultural analysis. They should also have acquired the ability to examine critically various aspects of Italian history and culture.
Objectives:	 # have developed a critical understanding of Italian society; # have developed skills in the analysis of literary texts written in Italian;
	# have acquired the ability to examine critically various aspects of Italian history, culture and literature.
Assessment:	Two assignments of 750 words each 40% (due mid-semester and at the end of semester respectively), a 250-word analysis of a specific text 20% (due mid-semester), a 750-word class paper in Italian 20% and a 1000-word class paper 20% (due at the end of semester).
Prescribed Texts:	A subject reader will be available from the University of Melbourne Bookshop.
