Subject Overview:	In this subject, which is a continuation of MGRK10003 (LaTrobe-Greek Beginners A) , students should learn to handle common interpersonal transactions in Greek with confidence, and to understand and produce (in speech and writing) simple descriptions, narrations and expressions of attitudes and opinions. Relevant aspects of contemporary Greek society and culture are also introduced. The emphasis continues to be on practice at listening, reading, speaking and writing Greek in everyday situations, but students are also introduced to the structure of the language.
Objectives:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> # understand authentic Greek speech and writing to the point of handling common interpersonal transactions confidently, and of understanding and producing simple descriptions, narrations, and expressions
Assessment:	Weekly assignments and class exercises of 1200 words 40% (due throughout the semester), a 1-hour written test 10% (due mid-semester), a 1-hour written test 20% (due at the end of semester) and a 30-minute oral/aural test 30% (due at the end of semester).
