Students will build on their previous study and be able to read relatively complex texts as well as increasing their knowledge of traditional Chinese culture. They should be able to conduct discussion on a wide range of topics.
Objectives:	<ul> <li># read a variety of extracts from modern literature.</li> <li># be familiar with traditional Chinese culture.</li> <li># write Standard Chinese in a variety of styles.</li> <li># acquire skills to write effectively on complex cultural issues, drawing on knowledge drawn from written sources.</li> <li># have knowledge of a difficult system of written communication requiring intensive time discipline and regular application of effort. and</li> <li># acquire skills to discuss contemporary issues and their historical and cultural backgrounds orally and in writing.</li> </ul>
Assessment:	A 1-hour composition test 20% (mid-semester), a 10-minute oral examination 10% (during the examination period), a 2-hour examination 60% (during the examination period), ongoing class work 5% and ongoing class participation 5%.
