Subject Overview:	This subject is a continuation of Chinese 5A. It involves advanced spoken and written Chinese. Students will read a variety of extracts from Modern Chinese and improve their writing and speaking skills.
Objectives:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> # read a variety of extracts from modern literature. # write Standard Chinese in a variety of styles. # acquire skills to communicate knowledge in a formal way, drawing on a broad understanding of literate culture. # acquire skills to invest time and effort systematically to bring literacy skills to higher levels of sophistication. and # be able to discuss contemporary issues and their historical and cultural backgrounds orally and in writing with increased levels of sophistication.
Assessment:	A 1-hour composition test 20% (mid-semester), a 10-minute oral examination 10% (during the examination period), a 2-hour examination 60% (during the examination period), ongoing class work 5% and ongoing class participation 5%.
