Students will also continue their collaborative experience by crewing for other students. On this production, students will aslo have the opportunity to collaborate with students from the Postgraduate Diploma in Film and Television (Producing). Prior to completion of their studies students will take part in an industry orientation program.			
Objectives:	On completion of this subject students should be able to:  # demonstrate advanced directing skills in the conception, proudction and completion of a major production;  # demonstrate strong creative and technical screen production skills;  # exhibit extensive knowledge of the film, television and allied industries.			
Assessment:	Continuous and based on submission of major production, class exercises and crewing undertaken: Major production (5 to 15 minutes) (50%); crewing on a minimum of 2 productions (30%); participation* and class exercises (20%). (*Participation assessed on criteria of engagement, ability to discuss & give/receive feedback and teamwork skills.) For this subject there is an 80% attendance hurdle for workshops, classes, lectures, demonstrations and tutorials.
