The placement occurs as an intensive learning experience, outside of the coursework timetable.

Assessment:	A hurdle requirement of 100% attendance at a field preparation seminar, field placement and integration seminars totalling 35 days. A 3,000 word practice portfolio and report assessed on a pass/fail basis. The portfolio is developed throughout the duration of the placement, and is due at the end of semester.
