At the end of the semester students should be able to communicate effectively and accurately in both spoken and written Russian.		
Objectives:	 # Be able to communicate effectively and accurately in both spoken and written Russian on topics of some depth. # Be able to demonstrate a good knowledge of the basic grammatical system, and an active or passive knowledge of the relevant vocabulary from the textbook and other teaching materials. # Be able to translate from Russian into English fairly complex texts without a dictionary and texts of medium difficulty with a dictionary. # Have a deepened knowledge of Russian society and culture. 		
Assessment:	Regular assignments 50% (throughout the semester) and a written exam 50% (at the end of the semester). This subject has the following hurdle requirements: Regular participation in tutorials is required with a minimum of 75% attendance. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day and in-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked.
