In this course we will seek to understand some of the major names and trends in contemporary fiction from the Hispanic world (including masters such as Borges, Garcia Marquez and Vargas Llosa, as well as acclaimed filmmakers such as Pedro Almodovar and Guillermo del Toro) in their respective national and cultural contexts.
