<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject presents a measure-theoretic approach to probability theory, its fundamental concepts and results. It also demonstrates how the theory relates to the key ideas of mathematical statistics, explaining why one is able to make meaningful statistical inference from data and how to apply probability theory to analysing the properties of statistical procedures.																					

	Topics covered include: probability spaces and random variables, conditional expectations and sufficient statistics, modes of convergence in probability theory, characteristic functions and key limit theorems, large sample theory and analysis of the maximum likelihood estimators.
<b>Objectives:</b>	On completion of this subject students should: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># Have a systematic understanding of modern probability theory;</li> <li># Have a good knowledge of general conditional expectations, integral transforms and key ideas of different modes of convergence of random variables and distributions;</li> <li># Be able to interpret and apply fundamental concepts of statistical inference, such as sufficiency and efficiency.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	Ten written assignments due at weekly intervals during semester amounting to a total of up to 50 pages (20%), and a 3-hour written examination in the examination period (80%).
