Students, under supervision, will develop a research question, and design an appropriate method to address the question. They will conduct a systematic literature review, a research protocol, analysis of previously collected data or data collection. Normally, students complete their coursework requirements before being enrolled for supervision of their Research Project.	
Objectives:	After completion of the Research Project candidates will be able to:  # critically review the existing research literature in an area of gender or women's health  # develop a research question  # design an appropriate research method to answer a research question  # conduct and evaluate research in gender or women's health  # present research findings in a written report  # communicate research findings in an oral presentation	
Assessment:	An oral presentation of 15 minutes (10 minute presentation, 5 minutes questions), due during the eleventh week of the first semester of enrolment (15%); an oral presentation of 20 minutes (15 minutes presentation, 5 minutes questions), due during the eleventh week of the second semester of enrolment (20%); a written research report of 5000 to 8,000 words, due during the examination period of the second semester of enrolment (65%). Students must pass the written research report (hurdle).
