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Subject Overview:	This subject combines a study of the Asian cultural sector today, referencing the visual arts, collecting institutions and the performing arts, with consideration of the demands of working collaboratively between Australia and Asian countries. The subject examines the different social, political and cultural backgrounds of North Asia, Southeast Asia and South Asia and the ramifications for engagement with practitioners in these areas. The approach to the material is topic-based and content will vary from year to year depending on the composition of the class.
Objectives:	Upon successful completion of this subject, students are expected to: # Have an understanding of the complexity of the region as a whole and how cultural, social and economic perspective inform arts practice and its delivery; # Have a detailed understanding of the nature of contemporary artistic production and organisation in selected countries; and # Feel confident to initiate projects in the region.
Assessment:	Seminar preparation and participation with a paper totalling 2000 words 40% (due during semester), and a 3000 word paper 60% (due in the examination period). Students are required to attend a minimum of 80% (or 10 out of 12) classes in order to qualify to have their written work assessed. Any student who fails to meet this hurdle without valid reason will not be eligible to pass the subject. All required written work must be submitted in order to pass the subject. Essays submitted after the due date without an extension will be penalised 2% per day. Essays submitted after two weeks of the assessment due date without a formally approved application for special consideration or an extension will only be marked on a pass/fail basis if accepted.
