Students not participating in the Endeavour program submit their written report towards the end of semester and complete their oral presentation during the exam period.Intended Learning Outcome (ILO) 1 will be assessed through the student's performance in research workspace.ILOs 2 to 4 will be assessed through the student's written report.

These researchers will be their guides and mentors on the project. Students will also be provided with access to key relevant research papers. They will be expected to identify further material which they will be able to access
