Subject Overview:	In this subject students will be introduced to the history of screenwriting and the principles of the craft of writing scripts for screen. Students will read and respond to a variety of scripts written for screen. Students will also be required to write a short script, with accompanying synopsis and storyboard. This subject is highly recommended for students intending to take Advanced Screenwriting and/or Writing for Theatre in their 3rd year studies.
Learning Outcomes:	On completion of the subject students should have:
	# an appreciation of the screenplay as a historically, culturally and technically distinct form of writing; # the ability to apply the basic technical elements of screenwriting;
	<ul> <li># demonstrated a functional knowledge of basic screenwriting terminology;</li> <li># developed, through workshopping and completion of assessment tasks, an understanding</li> </ul>
	of the skills, concepts and history that underpin the writing of a screenplay;  # learnt how to reconceptualise and rewrite through extensive presentation through work-in- progress during workshops;  # demonstrated a greater facility with writing, collaboration, communication and the giving and receiving of constructive feedback.
Assessment:	Attendance and participation in workshops 10%, a 1000 word synopsis of an existing screenplay (due mid-semester) 15%, an 800 word work-in-progress script to be workshopped in class during semester 15%, a 2000 word script for screen (due at the end of semester) 50%, a 200 word synopsis of the final script with an accompanying one-page visual storyboard of a scene from the script 10%, submitted with the final script at the end of the semester. This subject has a minimum hurdle requirement of 80% attendance and regular participation in tutorials. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject.
