<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject involves a practical and theoretical study of how humans construct and communicate meaning through the expressive symbol systems of the arts. Its focus will be on narrative in the traditional forms of drama, literature, visual arts, music, dance, and also contemporary hybrid forms. The practical content will be supported by a series of lecture/tutorials in which appropriate theoretical frameworks from a number of disciplines will be introduced. Focus texts include those produced for children and young adults. In this subject students will be involved in making narrative and artistic texts across a range of genres and within a variety of contexts. Artistic texts will be taken to mean music, performance and visual texts in addition to the more traditional written and spoken forms. Students, individually and in groups, will also analyse the use of story and symbol in artmaking and the co-construction of meaning with an audience in a diverse range of settings. This subject is suitable for students with little formal art or writing background.
<b>Learning Outcomes:</b>	Students will demonstrate: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• An enhanced understanding of visual and textual narrative and the relationships between them and with audiences;</li> <li>• An understanding of construction and communication of multiple symbol systems;</li> <li>• The capacity to understand and apply a range of symbolic and expressive systems;</li> <li>• An enhanced capacity to critically analyse a range of visual and narrative texts in and across cultural contexts;</li> <li>• The ability to make an original visual and/or textual narrative;</li> <li>• An enhanced capacity to create, imagine and innovate, and to reflect on these processes.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	There will be two items of assessment. Item 1: A 15 minute class presentation, 1600 words equivalent, due mid semester, 40% Item 2: Students may choose to complete one of two final assignments, due end of semester, 60% Assignment A: A 2400 word written analysis of a response to a narrative Assignment B: A 2400 word equivalent negotiated project
<b>Prescribed Texts:</b>	Readings will be given out in class.
