Subject Overview:	The geographic map—which contains an abundance of information—has, to date, received little consideration in the literary-historical investigation of emotions. Students will consider the affect and emotions behind mapping in both literature and history, examining how cartographers and writers responded to and charted the world around them. Case studies will include seventeenth-and eighteenth-century attempts to map the Alpine territory inhabited by the Piedmontese Waldesians, along with Matthew Flinders' account of the circumnavigation of Australia, Terra Australis (1810). Key issues to be investigated will involve the politics of mapping, colonization, aesthetics and psycho-geography.
Learning Outcomes:	To provide advanced intensive instruction in a topic or area of scholarship in the humanities, social sciences or creative arts. A student who completes this subject should have: # enhanced knowledge of the topic or area of scholarship taught in the module; # an ability to reflect upon their own research work in relation to the content of the module; # enhanced engagement with leading-edge research in Arts today.
Assessment:	one 500-word essay proposal. Due during the teaching period (20%) one 2000-word essay. Due within four weeks of completion of teaching (80%)
