Subject Overview:	This subject requires students to study and research construction and conservation methods of East Asian timber buildings, and to produce drawings and writings highlighting details of such buildings. Students are also required to produce virtual displays highlighting the chosen structure, and possible alternatives, in their potential contexts. As well as the above, students will be required to spend at least three hours a week in the construction workshop producing a full-size timber building that will be erected, initially, adjacent to the workshop and then in a public location.
Learning Outcomes:	On completion students should have a clear understanding of the construction techniques of traditional East Asian timber buildings and knowledge of the requirements and methods of their conservation.
Assessment:	Scaled model and Detail drawings (group work), due week 4, 15%, 500 word equivalent per student. Research paper and Journal (individual), due during exam period, 45%, 2500 words. Building Construction/Decoration (group), due week 12, 40%, 2000 word equivalent per student.
