Subject Overview:	This subject is designed to give students an understanding and knowledge of the variability of past civilisations by comparing their accomplishments and inner structures. Using a combination of texts and archaeology, it will compare the life cycle (rise and fall) of Egyptian, Near Eastern and Persian civilisations. Students will examine cultural elements such as belief systems, daily routines, gender roles, power and authority, which will provide an insight into the distinctive worldviews that shaped each civilization. Material culture, historical documents, language and literature, will be combined to address major issues such as the social evolution of complex societies and their eventual collapse, themes which resonate in the contemporary world.
Learning Outcomes:	Students who successfully complete this subject will:  # possess a knowledge of the social, political and cultural development of the ancient civilizations of Egypt and the Near East;  # have developed a knowledge of textual and archaeological methods to study processes of cultural change and interaction;  # demonstrate high-level skills in critical thinking and analysis;  # demonstrate effective communication skills, both in written work and in the classroom;  # demonstrate a deep understanding of social, ethical and cultural contexts.
Assessment:	A class paper 500 words, 12.5% and follow up essay of 2000 words 50% (due at the end of week 6), and a take-home exam of 1500 words , 37.5% (due in the examination period). Hurdle Requirement: students must attend a minimum of 75% of tutorials in order to pass this subject. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day. After five working days late assessment will not be marked. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject.
