Prerequisites:	Admission into the Honours program in the Department of Genetics through either the Bachelor of Science (Degree with Honours) or the Bachelor of Biomedicine (Degree with Honours).

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Subject Overview:	This subject involves laboratory, bioinformatics or field-based research in an area of genetics. The research projects available cover a broad range of research from molecular to population and evolutionary genetics in micro-organisms, insects, plants and animals including humans. The project will be based in the laboratory of an academic staff member of the department or an approved external supervisor, depending on the particular research project.
	The research project aims to develop a range of experimental and technical skills, a capacity to set goals and to design and plan experiments. It also provides students with skills and knowledge for understanding original research and enhanced written and oral communication skills.
	In addition to help and guidance from their supervisor(s) each student has a committee, which regularly meets with them and provides additional help and expertise. This committee is responsible for assessment of the research project subject.
	Students enrol in a total of 75 points of research project across the duration of the Honours program. This is achieved by enrolling in a combination of the following subjects in appropriate semesters to achieve a total 75 credit points.

	# GENE40005 Genetics Research Project – 50 points
	This subject (GENE40001 Genetics Research Project) is the 25 point version for one semester (Semester 1).
Learning Outcomes:	Upon completion of this subject, students should have:

	 # acquired experience in planning and executing experimental genetics research; # understood the way in which experiments in genetics are designed, communicated and interpreted; # extended their abilities in oral and written scientific communication; # gained the ability to read and assimilate specific research papers and to understand how the research reported relates to the broad field of genetics; and # developed effective skills in data collection and analysis, and postulating testable hypotheses based on these data. The subject involves experimental research in the area of genetics under the direction of a supervisor.
Assessment:	The following assessment requirements are applicable to the entire 75 point Research Project component. One written exercise (not more than 1000 words) due early in Semester 1 (10%) One written thesis (not more than 12,000 words) due at the end of Semester 2 (75%) Committee assessment of research performance (5%) One 30-minute oral presentation late in Semester 2 (10%)
