Subject Overview:	This subject gives students majoring in Hebrew and Jewish Studies the opportunity to extend and deepen their knowledge of the topic, sharpen their critical faculties in relation to source material and secondary literature, and acquire substantial skills in planning and executing a research project. It is only available to students taking the Hebrew and Jewish Studies major.
Learning Outcomes:	Students who successfully complete this subject will: # have broadened their knowledge of the relevant subject. # have further developed research skills.
Assessment:	A research essay of 4000 words in Hebrew or English on a prescribed topic in consultation with the co-ordinator 100% (due at the end of semester). Hurdle requirement: students must attend a minimum of 75% of classes/meetings in order to pass this subject. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day; after five working days, no late assessment will be marked. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject.
