Most popularly known as the lyricist of <i>West Side Story</i> , Sondheim's work covers an astonishing range of subject matter, exhibiting song-writing craft that has challenged and ultimately contributed to the development new forms of music theatre. The practical work, delivered in the supportive environment of singing within a large group, will explore the complexity and joy of Sondheim's music whilst developing skills in safe voice usage and technique, basic music notation, harmonies, song structure and style and storytelling through song. Embedded lectures will focus on the Sondheim's early influences, including Bernstein and Hammerstein; collaborations with such greats as Jerome Robbins (<i>West Side Story</i> , <i>Gypsy</i>), Hal Prince (<i>Company</i> , <i>Sweeney Todd</i>) and James Lapine (<i>Into the Woods</i> , <i>Sunday in the Park with George</i>) and finally the influence he has had on new artists like Adam Guettel and Jason Robert Brown. The subject will conclude with a short performance featuring a sample of the repertoire covered. No former singing or musical experience is necessary.
