Subject Overview:	<p>This subject combines traditional classroom teaching and learning with hands-on fieldwork and workshop exercises to enable students to develop a working knowledge of practical archaeology and its methods within the context of modern research and archaeology in Australia and the Old World (the Near east, Mediterranean and Europe). The subject assumes no prior knowledge of archaeology. It will introduce students to some of the main fieldwork, scientific and interpretive methods involved in practical archaeology. Students will use the University's extensive antiquities collection to develop their practical skills and knowledge about how we can record and interpret the past from archaeological data.</p> <p>Note: The tutorials are organised according to four 'blocks' (each approx. 3 hours duration): surveying; fieldwork; artefact analysis; and study of standing monuments.</p>
Learning Outcomes:	<p>Students who successfully complete this subject will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # demonstrate a detailed knowledge and understanding of the main skills and methods involved in practical archaeology; # apply appropriate critical research skills, analytical methodologies and interpretative techniques (including archaeological surveying, excavation, artefact analysis and recording) involved in practical archaeology; # identify and engage critically with key sources, skills and methods involved in practical archaeology; # identify and engage critically with scholarship in the field of practical archaeology; # approach all sources, skills and methods involved in practical archaeology with intellectual honesty and a respect for ethical values; # work effectively, in groups and independently, to identify, discuss and critically analyse key issues practical archaeology; # communicate skills, methods and interpretations involved in practical archaeology effectively, both orally and in writing.
Assessment:	Four short exercises of 250 words each, due throughout the two-week intensive (30%) an assignment of 1000 words, due 2nd week of intensive (30%) a report of 2000 words, due 3 weeks after the end of teaching (40%) Hurdle requirement: students must attend 75% or at least

	three of the four tutorial blocks all pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject Note: Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day; after five working days, no late assessment will be marked. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked.
