Subject Overview:	This subject focuses on the spoken and written language and culture of present day Italy. Students will undertake regular activities in order to improve their linguistic and cultural skills. They will also participate in regular conversation practice for the purpose of reinforcing their command of current idiomatic Italian. Students will explore aspects of contemporary Italian culture and language, through a critical analysis of a variety of texts and documents (including films, music, mass media and literature). By the end of the subject, students should have			

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	improved their written production skills and should be able to express themselves with fluency on most topics of a general nature.	
Learning Outcomes:	On successful completion of this subject, students should: # be able to interpret and analyse a variety of genres, including literary texts, and film, in Italian, directly relevant to Italian-speaking social and cultural contexts; # have developed an increasing capacity in using language structures and resources, in order to communicate effectively in Italian both in writing and speaking; # be able to apply research methods across different media for analysis and interpretation; # have developed an increasing understanding of the diversity of Italian language and culture; # have strengthened their ability to compare and contrast linguistic and cultural similarities and differences between Italian language and culture and other languages and cultures; # have strengthened their ability to apply a variety of learning techniques across tasks and contexts to consolidate knowledge, and ability in relation to Italian language and culture; # have improved reflective skills; # be able to work in an effective manner in an Italian-speaking context both individually and cooperative.	
Assessment:	One small research project and critical analysis (400 words) due in Week 6 [10%] Written assignment (400 words) due in Week 7 [10%] One 1-hour mid-semester test (equivalent to 800 words) due in Week 8 [20%] One oral presentation (equivalent to 400 words) from week 10 to 12 [10%] One final written assignment and reflective journal (1600 words) during the examination period [40%] Participation in class throughout the semester [10%] This subject has the following hurdle requirements: Regular participation in tutorials is required with a minimum of 75% attendance. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject. Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per day and in-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked.
