<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject will provide students with a grounding in key aspects of media law that all journalists need to be aware of, and offer students an opportunity to engage with particular ethical dilemmas that arise in the field of journalism. It will provide students with an opportunity to gain a deep understanding and capacity to reflect on legal and ethical principles, as well as an understanding of how such knowledge is relevant to the ongoing dilemmas and decisions that journalists are faced with in the course of their work.
<b>Learning Outcomes:</b>	<p>Students who successfully complete this subject should:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>·have a sound grasp of the legal and ethical issues associated with the history, theory and current practice of journalism;</li> <li>·have a sound grasp of key aspects of media law;</li> <li>·be able to outline the legal and ethical responsibilities associated with journalism;</li> <li>·be equipped to critically reflect on legal and ethical principles related to the practice of journalism;</li> <li>·be able to apply knowledge of legal and ethical principles to dilemmas that arise in the course of journalism practice; and</li> <li>·be able to make sound decisions in journalism practice based on knowledge of the law, ethics and case-based examples.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	An essay of 1,500 words and an analysis of an ethical problem 1,500 words (60%) due early in the semester, and an analysis of a legal problem 2,000 words (40%) due six weeks after the last class. Students are required to attend a minimum of 80% of classes in order to pass this subject.
