Subject Overview:	<p>This subject provides those working with funding and the governance of research and innovation with knowledge and insights in areas such as:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # structured overview of STI policy (theory and practice); # review of the state of the art in tools and methods for funding STI capacity building; # structured forum for policy learning and exchange of ideas. 						
Learning Outcomes:	<p>On completion, participants should be able to apply what they have learned, for example by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # conducting and presenting science and technology policy analyses; 						

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> # preparing policy briefs; # matching policy objectives to funding instruments; # ability to identify and analyse science and technology policy trends.
Assessment:	<p>There are two assessment tasks: A 3000-word written assignment due at end of subject, graded assessment. Four online Discussion Board tasks (4 x 500-word commentaries on set readings) due every 2 weeks, pass/fail assessment. For any discussion board task submitted late, the task increases to a 1000 word commentary. There is one hurdle requirement: Participate in 3 online webinars* due every 2-3 weeks. For any webinar missed, students must write and post on the discussion board a 1000 word topic summary, drawing on the recorded webinar and related discussion board postings. NB: All hurdle and assessment tasks must be passed. *For any webinar missed, students must write and post on the discussion board a 1000 word topic summary, drawing from the recorded webinar and related discussion board postings. Attendance at all classes (tutorial/seminars/practical classes/lectures/labs/online classes) is obligatory. Failure to attend 80% of classes will normally result in failure in the subject.</p>
