<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This course builds on the knowledge acquired by students in 110-207 Chinese 2D or 110-161 Chinese 2F (previously offered as Chinese 1B). Students should broaden their listening comprehension and speaking skills and gain confidence and independence in handling written Chinese language materials and in making the transition from textbook material to original Chinese texts.
<b>Assessment:</b>	Short tests and/or assignments 20% (commencing 2nd week and before the end of semester), an oral test 15% (during the examination period), a listening and comprehension test 15% (during the examination period), a final examination 40% (during the examination period) and continuous class participation 10%.
<b>Prescribed Texts:</b>	Speaking Chinese About China 1 (Du Rong and Helen T Lin) Beijing Foreign Languages Printing House 2002 (second revision)
<b>Breadth Options:</b>	This subject is a level 2 or level 3 subject and is not available to new generation degree students as a breadth option in 2008. This subject or an equivalent will be available as breadth in the future. Breadth subjects are currently being developed and these existing subject details can be used as guide to the type of options that might be available. 2009 subjects to be offered as breadth will be finalised before re-enrolment for 2009 starts in early October.
