Subject Overview:	This is a beginners' post-introductory Japanese subject. This subject enhances skills that enable students to communicate in Japanese and to manage daily life in Japan. Further basic Japanese sentence patterns, vocabulary and expressions are introduced, as well as another 100 basic kanji (Chinese characters). This subject also includes various aspects of Japanese culture that are relevant to effective communication.
Assessment:	A 2-hour final examination 50% (due during the examination period), one 10-minute oral exam 10% (due late in semester), a listening test 20% (due mid-semester), in-class composition test 10% (end of semester) and project work 10% (throughout the semester).
