Subject Overview:	This subject provides students with an opportunity to read and listen to various types of authentic Japanese materials with some modification and learn to communicate on a wide range of topics. Students will learn 100 kanji (Chinese characters) and will be introduced to various aspects of Japanese culture. Computer laboratory instruction will support the curriculum.
Assessment:	Oral test (week 12) 15%, an oral presentation 5% (weeks 4 to 8), a Listening test 10% (week 11), written assignments 20% (during semester) and a final examination 50% (examination period).
