<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject compares the way that the two major dictatorships of the inter-war period were ruled in terms of their domestic and foreign policy, the popularity of the regimes and the reasons for their success and failure in WW2. Students will complete this subject with an improved understanding of the complexities of the systems, structures and individuals that contributed to these developments and a more sophisticated understanding of their differences.
<b>Assessment:</b>	Two argumentative research essays on comparative themes. Each of 2000 words 50% each (one due mid-semester the other due at the end of semester).
<b>Prescribed Texts:</b>	Prescribed Texts:A subject reader will be available from the Bookroom at the beginning of semester.
