Subject Overview:	This subject focuses on modern Hebrew literary texts, and modern conversational idiom and grammar. At the completion of this subject students should have an enriched knowledge of the language through the use of modern Hebrew literature, of the modern idiom spoken in Israel today and its vocabulary, grammar and syntax, and be prepared for a broader range of expertise.
Assessment:	Written essays totalling 2000 words 40% throughout semester, a ten minute oral exam 10% and a two hour written examination 50% at the end of semester.
