Entry Requirements:	<p># an undergraduate degree with a major in linguistics, applied linguistics or English language with a grade average equivalent to an H2A (75%) at the University of Melbourne in the major</p> <p>or</p> <p># an undergraduate degree with a major in English, education, a language other than English, speech pathology, psychology, sociology or cognate discipline and a grade average equivalent to at least H2A (75%) at the University of Melbourne in the major, together with professional training or experience in language related areas, such as language teaching, interpreting and translation, or speech pathology</p> <p>or</p> <p># a Graduate Diploma in Arts (English Language) with a grade equivalent to an H2A (75%) average at the University of Melbourne.</p> <p>Referee reports and employers' references to assess the applicant's eligibility may be required.</p>
