Admission will be determined on a case-by-case basis by the subject coordinators.

Subject Overview:	<p>Objectives:</p> <p>A candidate who has successfully completed the internship should:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # Have detailed knowledge of the institution or organisation where they are undertaking their internship # Have a detailed knowledge of at least one major legal issue facing the institution or organisation where they are undertaking their internship # Understand some of the legal, policy, political and organisational/ institutional factors that influence the institution or organisation where they are undertaking their internship. <p>Syllabus:</p> <p>The International Legal Internship allows candidates to gain credit for undertaking advanced legal research and analysis on an approved international internship of at least ten weeks of full-time work in an approved international institution or organisation. The program is focused on providing candidates with an opportunity to engage with legal and policy issues in contemporary society through work experience and further developing oral and written communication skills. Candidates are required to secure and fund their internships personally. Students are encouraged to discuss their internships proposals with the subject coordinators.</p>
Assessment:	Research paper 10,000 words (100%) (topic approved by the academic supervisor). The research paper must be submitted three months after the completion of the internship, the date to be confirmed with the academic supervisor.
