<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject is an advanced unit introducing the techniques of Chinese newspaper analysis for fields such as politics, international affairs, intellectual debates etc. Students will use current reading materials to study a range of social and political affairs in the People's Republic of China. On completion of the subject students should be able to read news articles in Chinese with the aid of a dictionary; demonstrate a knowledge of issues of current importance for Chinese society; have an understanding of the function of news media in Chinese society; and develop analytical skills in dealing with Chinese material.
<b>Objectives:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># be able to read news articles in Chinese with the aid of a dictionary;</li> <li># demonstrate a knowledge of issues of current importance for Chinese society;</li> <li># have an understanding of the function of news media in Chinese society;</li> <li># develop analytical skills in dealing with Chinese material;</li> <li># acquire skills to understand social and cultural context;</li> <li># acquire skills to research an issue through competent use of library and other information sources;</li> <li># acquire skills to manage and organise workloads.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	A translation exercise 500 words 20% (due mid-semester), an essay of 1500 words 20% (due in week 8) and a 2-hour final examination 60% (during the examination period).
