Subject Overview:	This subject is an overview of trends in modern Indonesian literature in English translation from the Nationalist period to the present. A variety of literary works are read and discussed, placing them within their historical and cultural context. On completion of the subject, students should be familiar with the major schools of literature in modern Indonesia and their relationship to Indonesian historical trends; and have read and analysed a number of important modern Indonesian literary works of various genres.
Objectives:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> # have read and analysed a number of important modern Indonesian literary works of various genres; # will increase their global Indonesia language proficiency in oral and written analytical discussion and in the diverse areas of human concern that serve as the topics of Indonesian literary works;
Assessment:	Two assignments of 1000 words 20% each (due mid-semester and end semester), an essay of 1500 words 30% (due late semester) and a 1.5-hour written examination 30% (due during the examination period).
Prescribed Texts:	A subject reader will be available from the Bookroom at the beginning of semester
