Subject Overview:	This subject involves the study of modern literary texts and modern conversational idiom and grammar. Students should complete the subject with an enriched knowledge of the language through the use of modern Hebrew literature, of the modern idiom spoken in Israel today, including its vocabulary, grammar and syntax. The subject should prepare students for a broader range of expertise.

Assessment:	Written essays totalling 2000 words throughout semester 40% , a ten minute oral exam 10% and a two hour written examination 50% at the end of semester.
Prescribed Texts:	A subject reader will be available at the beginning of semester
