<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject involves the study of advanced modern literary texts, including contemporary Hebrew writers in prose and poetry, modern conversational idiom, and newspaper and academic articles. Creative writing in Hebrew is also introduced. Students should complete the subject with the ability to read and understand advanced scientific and academic articles and essays.
<b>Objectives:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># have acquired a knowledge of advanced literary texts in Hebrew;</li> <li># have further developed their reading skills and understanding of advanced scientific and academic articles and essays, enriching their knowledge of the modern idiom written and spoken in Israel today.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	Written essays throughout the semester 50%, two hour exam 50% at the end of semester.
<b>Prescribed Texts:</b>	A subject reader will be available from the Bookroom at the beginning of semester
