<b>Level:</b>	3 (Undergraduate)
<b>Dates &amp; Locations:</b>	2009, This subject commences in the following study period/s: Semester 1, - Taught on campus. Semester 2, - Taught on campus. Practical laboratory classes.

<b>Subject Overview:</b>	The two subjects <i>Laboratory Work A</i> and <i>Laboratory Work B</i> are offered sequentially. In both subjects laboratory work draws from a common pool of experiments. Practical experience is available in the following laboratories: nuclear physics, particle physics, diffraction, electronics, atomic physics, optical physics and astronomy. Workshop experience is also available; in some laboratories individual projects can be selected. <i>Laboratory Work B</i> offers the possible extension to research project work.
<b>Objectives:</b>	Students completing this subject should be able to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># demonstrate an understanding of a wide variety of advanced experimental and data analysis techniques;</li> <li># acquire, analyse and interpret experimental data; and</li> <li># write and evaluate scientific and technical reports.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	Ongoing assessment of laboratory work during the semester, consisting of laboratory participation (28%), record keeping (57%) and written reports (15%) up to a total of 9000 words.
