Course Overview:	<p>This course is aimed at health care professionals working in the infant mental health field, who wish to develop their understanding and clinical skills in working with infants and parents or who are interested in participating in service development, delivery and evaluation.</p> <p>The course focuses primarily on the baby and the infant/parent relationships and provides training in skilled assessment and intervention with families which can greatly assist the capacity of parents to facilitate their child's development. Infant and Parent Mental Health therefore is able to play a major role in the prevention of serious psychiatric disability.</p> <p>The course has been developed out of clinical teaching work of the Infant Mental Health Group at the Royal Children's Hospital and draws on the disciplines of psychiatry, developmental psychology and psychoanalysis for its theoretical basis.</p> <p>The Masters course aims to provide a thorough knowledge of the principles and practice of infant mental health and equip students to directly apply the knowledge and skills gained to intervene effectively with infants and families presenting with infant mental health problems.</p>																										
Objectives:	<p>On completion of this course participants will have:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # gained an increased knowledge of clinical skills, developed in assessing and treating infants and families with mental health problems; and # developed expertise in direct clinical work, consultation and liaison, early intervention and research. 																										
Course Structure & Available Subjects:	Students will be required to complete all seven coursework subjects (each of which will have a written assessment of between 1,500 - 3,000 words) and a research project of 12-15,000 words.
