As the world enters the 'Asian Century', students can hone their expertise and knowledge in this area by choosing from a range of subjects focusing on Asian legal systems and societies.
Objectives:	The Graduate Diploma in Asian Law focuses on: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # The legal systems of East and South East Asia in their social, political and economic context # How Asian lawyers, business people and legislators may respond to particular legal issues # The relevance of different Asian legal experiences in Australia # The articulation of knowledge and understanding in oral and written presentations # The design, conduct and reporting of original research.
Course Structure & Available Subjects:	Students must complete four subjects from the prescribed list. Students who do not have a law degree from a common law jurisdiction or any prior legal studies or experience are also expected to complete the two-day preliminary subject Australian Legal Process and Legal Institutions (http://www.masters.law.unimelb.edu.au/index.cfm?objectid=3A45C705-1422-207C-BA6886C167CEB45F&view=overview&sid=4762) . Students may discuss other subject options with the Director of Studies.
