Subject Overview:	This is a small chamber choir of 12–20 members that performs music of the middle ages, renaissance and baroque. The ensemble performs both a cappella and also in conjunction with other early music ensembles.
Objectives:	On completion of this subject students should be able to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # show technical development as ensemble musicians # participate with ability and self-confidence as a team member of a performing group # perform selected repertoire to concert standard # identify and exhibit specific knowledge of a range of ensemble repertoire # exhibit an informed respect for the values and principles of ensemble performance.
Assessment:	Preparation of parts, individual and/or sectional practice and active participation in all rehearsals, classes and performances as directed (75%); attendance and submission of a concert report of three appropriate concerts (500 words each, due weeks 4, 8 and 12) (25%). Less than 80% attendance will result in a fail. All assessment components must be passed in order to pass the subject, including the timely, satisfactory completion of all three concert reports.
