<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject will survey the emerging importance of historical ideas in architecture from the Enlightenment to early Modernism. It will include: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># the rise of archaeology and neo-classicism;</li> <li># the picturesque, romanticism and rationalism;</li> <li># the industrial revolution, engineering and functionalism; the rise of the architecture profession and new institutions;</li> <li># colonialism and the new world metropolis;</li> <li># nationalism and imperialism in both the East and West;</li> <li># relations of local vernacular to high architecture.</li> </ul> Buildings will be considered within their social, cultural, environmental and landscape contexts with analysis of issues such as spatial organisation, technologies and emerging theories of architecture as text and idea.
<b>Objectives:</b>	On completion of this subject, students will be able to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># demonstrate an understanding of key concepts in the history of architecture;</li> <li># analyse buildings and places in terms of their context, form, planning, &amp; theoretical ideas;</li> <li># demonstrate an understanding of architecture as a form of social representation.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	Drawn and/or written tutorial exercises between weeks 2 and 10 (totalling 30%) to the total equivalent of 1500 words;A 1500-word essay due in week 10 (30%);A two-hour end-of-semester examination (40%).
