Subject Overview:	This subject will further develop the range of students' listening and speaking skills. expand their experience of Chinese prose styles. and improve their ability to communicate in written Chinese.
Objectives:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> # be able to function in Chinese in a wider range of formal situations. # be able to make short speeches in Chinese on a wider range of topics. # have the basic skills to deal with a number of areas in written business correspondence. # develop skills in reading and translating modern Chinese prose. # become acquainted with some important aspects of contemporary and historical Chinese culture. # acquire information from written and aural sources outside one's own cultural realm, and be able to discuss that information in the communicative code in which it was originally produced. # be able to express oneself while following the norms of a complex communicative code. # and increase awareness of social issues while discussing them with an understanding of their cultural context.
Assessment:	Short tests and/or assignments 10% (commencing 2nd week and before the end of semester), an oral test 20% (during the examination period), a listening and comprehension test 20% (during the examination period), a final examination 40% (during the examination period) and continuous class participation 10%.
