At the conclusion of this subject, students should be able to independently read a variety of original Chinese material and to write modern standard Chinese in an acceptable style. They should also be able to conduct discussions in Chinese on social and cultural issues.
Objectives:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> # be able to read a variety of original Chinese material. # be able to write modern standard Chinese in an acceptable style. # be able to understand cultural context. # be able to discuss social and cultural issues in standard Chinese.
Assessment:	Class participation 10%, a mid-semester test 10%, an oral presentation 20% (at the end of semester), and a final 2-hour examination 60% (during examination period).
