<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject considers several key aspects of Soviet history from the death of Lenin in 1924 to the death of Stalin in 1953. The subject describes the growth of the Soviet state, the move from the New Economic Policy to planned industrialisation and collectivisation of agriculture, the growth of the Red Army, urbanisation and major social transformations. Students will be asked to consider Stalin's role in the political system from archival and other records, not exclusively from myth. They will also be required to consider both the successes of the regime, including victory in World War II, as well as the costs, including political repression.
<b>Objectives:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># understand how the Stalinist State system, the Soviet Planned Economy and the Red Army grew and developed in the thirty years from 1924 to 1953.</li> <li># be able to locate the role that Stalin and the Soviet Communist Party played in these developments.</li> <li># be able to assess the achievements of the State, including victory in World War 2, and gain an understanding of the costs involved in these developments.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	Two argumentative essays on comparative themes, each of 2000 words 50% each (one due mid-semester and the other due at the end of semester). Hurdle requirement: Students must attend a minimum of 75% of tutorials in order pass this subject.
<b>Prescribed Texts:</b>	A subject reader will be available.
