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Subject Overview:	This subject provides students with an opportunity to read and listen to various types of authentic Japanese materials with some modification and learn to communicate on a wide range of topics. Students will learn 100 kanji (Chinese characters) and will be introduced to various aspects of Japanese culture. Computer laboratory instruction will support the curriculum.
Objectives:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> # further consolidate and expand competence in Japanese, introducing different styles of expressions. # learn various styles of speech and genres of written texts including informal speech between friends and academic writing style writing. # particular attention is given to developing reading skills.
Assessment:	Three in-class tests, 20% (due throughout the semester), a written assignment 1000 words 20% (due mid-semester), 2-hour final examination 50%(examination period) and class participation 10%.
