<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject is an introduction to descriptive and theoretical approaches to the analysis of sound systems across languages. and different approaches to phonology, training in formal phonological analysis, and the development of phonological theory until the present.						
<b>Objectives:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># be able to appreciate the universal and typological features of sound systems.</li> <li># have developed skill in practical analysis and description of a wide range of phonological phenomena from a variety of languages.</li> <li># understand and be able to apply the basic concepts and methods of phonological analysis and description.</li> </ul>						
<b>Assessment:</b>	Two assignments totalling 2500 words 65% (due at regular intervals during the semester), and a problem-based 2-hour exam 35% (held in the examination period).
