Subject Overview:	This subject is designed to accommodate those who wish to pursue musical areas other than pure performance. This will aid in the career paths of those who wish to pursue the recording studio and its technology as a profession. The subject will compel students to spend part of the allotted time studying the practicalities of recording music, the current technology available, and the art of transferring live sounds to recordings to the satisfaction of performers and producers.
Objectives:	Upon completion of this subject students should be able to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # Have an understanding of the basics of recording technology and practice; # Have developed an ability to hear the technical aspects of recordings and to implement recording techniques for creative and accurate sound reproduction; # Understand the artistic flexibility, aesthetic implications and technological restrictions of the recording medium.
Assessment:	Continuous: Preparation and commitment as demonstrated by performance tasks an/or a regularly updated journal of activities embracing all areas studied (50%) - Hurdle requirement 80% attendance. Formal: One practical application of techniques learned throughout the semester. This will normally take the form of recording, editing and mastering a live performance of not more than 10 minutes duration (50%).
