<b>Subject Overview:</b>	For students who have completed Keyboard Skills (Beginner and Intermediate), or have achieved an appropriate level of keyboard musicianship as determined by the Lecturer. Areas to be covered include a more extensive understanding of sight-reading, harmonization of melodic lines, improvisation over a chord progression and transposition, and will include preparation of selected repertoire. The class will be conducted in the Yamaha electronic keyboard laboratory.								
<b>Objectives:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># to have a greater keyboard facility;</li> <li># to harmonise, improvise and transpose melodic phrases;</li> <li># to play selected repertoire to a competent standard.</li> </ul>								
<b>Assessment:</b>	Continuous: Preparation and commitment as demonstrated by performance tasks an/or a regularly updated journal of activities embracing all areas studied (50%) - Hurdle requirement 80% attendance. Formal: One practical test of approximately 10 minutes' duration consisting of presentation of a combination of prepared material and sight-reading (50%).
